





3. MTP IV KEY SECTOR PERFORMANCE FY2023/24



A. FINANCE AND PRODUCTION SECTOR ACHIEVEMENTS

KEY MACROECONOMIC INDICATORS

- 1) Real GDP grew by 5.6% in 2023 compared to 4.9% in 2022;
- 2) Government Revenue collected as at 30th June 2024 was KSh 2,702.6 Billion against a target of KSh 2,907.5 Billion;
- 3) Inflation rate dropped from 7.3% in July 2023 to 4.4% in August 2024;
- **4) Exports grew** from KSh 871 Billion in 2022 to KSh 1,007.9 Billion in 2023;
- 5) Balance of Payment recorded a lower deficit of USD 418 Million in the 4th Quarter of FY 2023/24 compared to a deficit of USD 461 Million in the 4th Quarter FY 2022/23;
- **6)** Current account deficit narrowed to USD 4,091.3 million in June 2024 compared to USD 4,840.9 million in June 2023, reflecting lower imports, increased export of goods and services as well as increased remittances

A. FINANCE AND PRODUCTION SECTOR ACHIEVEMENTS Cont...

OTHER ACHIEVEMENTS

- 1) Maize production increased by 38.8% (34.3 Million Bags in 2022 to 47.6 million bags in 2023);
- 2) Area under rice production increased to 24,404Ha;
- 3) Distributed 235,028 MT of **subsidized fertilizers** for planting and top dressing;
- **4) Marketed milk** production rose by 6.9% from 754.3 million litres in 2022 to 806.6 million litres in 2023;
- 5) Delivered 996 MT of hides and 10,579 MT of skins to tanneries;
- 6) Commissioned 18 county aggregation and industrial parks;
- 7) Incubated 1,002 MSMEs; and facilitated 1,487 MSMEs to access markets.



B. INFRASTRUCTURE SECTOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- 1) Constructed 559km of new roads;
- 2) Rehabilitated/ maintained 17,419km of rural and 32,519km of urban roads;
- 3) Established 1,368 free public Wi-Fi hotspots (Jikonnect);
- 4) Installed 8,959km of fibre optic cable;
- 5) Connected 150 public and county offices to the last mile internet connectivity;
- 6) Connected 341,563 new customers and 428 public institutions to the National Electricity Grid;
- 7) Constructed 6 small dams and 14 water pans; and
- 8) Acquired a total of 281,524 LPG 6kg cylinders for distribution to low-income households.



C. SOCIAL SECTOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- 1) 100% transition from Primary to Junior Secondary School;
- 2) Provided **loans and scholarships** to 112,741 university students and 151,933 TVET trainees;
- 3) Constructed 6,270 Secondary Classrooms and 900 Laboratories;
- 4) Created 848,200 jobs in 2023;
- **5)** Trained 63,097 youth at NYS;
- 6) Operationalized Social Health Insurance Scheme (SHI);
- 7) Provided cash transfers to 815,071 older persons and 269,879 Orphans and Vulnerable Children;
- 8) 124,568 households benefited from the Hunger and Safety Net Programmes;
- 9) Disbursed over **KSh 53.9 Billion** to individuals through the **Hustler fund**;
- 10) Engaged **107,000 Community health** promoters (CHPs).



D. ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES SECTOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- 1) Produced 975 Million tree seedlings and planted 300 million;
- 2) Rehabilitated 28,000 Ha of agroforestry in ASAL areas;
- 3) Formed 168 waste service provider associations;
- 4) Formalized 228 artisanal Mining SACCOs;
- 5) Established mineral value addition centers for fluorspar, gold and granite;
- **6) Tourism arrivals** increased from 1.48 Million in 2022 to 1.95 Million in 2023;
- 7) Tourism earnings rose from KSh 268.09 Billion in FY2022/23 to KSh 352.3 Billion in FY 2023/24; and
- 8) Placed 1,903 youths on green and blue jobs; and 1,500 in international shipping companies.



E. GOVERNANCE AND PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION SECTOR ACHIEVEMENTS

- 1) Diaspora remittances of over KSh. 580 Billion received;
- 2) Psychosocial support provided to 252,000 offenders;
- 3) Insurance cover provided to 106,469 security officers;
- 4) Court Cases clearance rate of 93% against a target of 94%



4. CHALLENGES IN MTP IV IMPLEMENTATION

- 1) Slow adoption of value chain approach;
- Constrained fiscal space;
- 3) Adverse effects of climate change;
- 4) Litigation that delays projects implementation;
- 5) Inadequate human resource capacity;
- 6) Slow uptake of emerging technologies;
- 7) Data quality (Accuracy, Validity, Completeness, Consistency and Timeliness); and
- 8) Weak intergovernmental coordination/engagement.


