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Sector Composition & Mandate(s)

The GJLO Sector is composed of 14 sub-sectors & 14 Semi-Autonomous Government Agencies (SAGAs)

- 1. State Department for Correctional Services: Responsible for correctional services, reform of penal justice, prison enterprises, and policies for incarcerated minors (KPS, PACS, General Administration).
- **2. State Department for Immigration and Citizen Services:** Manages migration services, population registration, data management, and e-citizen services.
- **3.** National Police Service: Protects life and property, maintains law and order, investigates crimes, and provides specialized services (e.g., border patrol, stock theft prevention).
- 4. State Department for Internal Security and National Administration: Oversees internal security, coordinates National Government functions in counties, policies on internal security, national crime research, and security personnel training.
- 5. State Law Office (SLO): Advises government bodies on legislative, constitutional, international law, human rights matters, and represents the government in legal proceedings.
- **6. Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC):** Prevents and combats corruption and economic crimes, promotes ethics, law enforcement, and public education.
- 7. Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP): Prosecutes criminal cases independently without external influence.
- 8. Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP): Registers and regulates political parties, administers the Political Parties Fund.
- **9. Witness Protection Agency (WPA):** Provides protection to witnesses facing threats due to cooperation with law enforcement.
- 10. Kenya National Commission on Human Rights (KNCHR): Promotes and protects human rights and constitutionalism.
- 11. Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission (IEBC): Supervises elections, referenda, and regulates electoral boundaries.
- 12. National Police Service Commission (NPSC): Manages human resources for the National Police Service.
- **13. National Gender and Equality Commission (NGEC):** Promotes gender equality and fights discrimination, focusing on special interest groups.
- 14. Independent Policing Oversight Authority (IPOA): Provides civilian oversight of police operations.






Analysis of Sector Resource Requirement versus Allocation

- The Governance, Justice, Law and Order Sector has a budgetary requirement amounting to Kshs. 441,618 million, Kshs. 448,390 million and Kshs. 463,354 million for the Financial Years 2025/26, 2026/27, and 2027/28 respectively.
- The Gross Sector projected Budgetary Allocation in the 2025/26 MTEF period is Ksh.241.4billion, Ksh.281 billion and Ksh.301.2 billion respectively. This includes the recurrent expenditures of Ksh.220 billion, Ksh.254.8billion and Ksh.269 billion and capital expenditure of Ksh.21.4billion, Ksh.26.2billion and Ksh.32.2 billion in the respective financial years.



Cross-Sector Linkages

 The GJLO Sector synergizes programs across sectors under Vision 2030, MTP IV, and BETA. It supports good governance, justice, and socio-economic rights while enabling other sectors.

Key Linkages:

- 1. Agriculture, Rural & Urban Development (ARUD): Provides security, human rights protection, and governance services; ARUD contributes to GJLO with sustainable resource management and food security.
- 2. Energy, Infrastructure & ICT (EI&ICT): GJLO creates legal and policy frameworks for energy and infrastructure projects; EI&ICT enhances GJLO's efficiency through ICT innovations.
- General Economic & Commercial Affairs (GECA): Provides
 policy and legal support for trade and security data; GECA promotes fair trade and consumer protection



Cross-Sector Linkages (continued)

- 4. Health Sector: GJLO ensures the legal framework for health reforms and Universal Health Coverage (UHC); the Health Sector helps sustain standards in public and private health.
- 5. Education Sector: GJLO provides legal and institutional frameworks; Education builds human capital, research, and governance capacity.
- 6. Public Administration & International Relations (PAIR): GJLO supports governance, security, and rule of law; PAIR promotes cohesion, transparency, and international relations.
- 7. National Security (NS): GJLO works with NS on crime prevention, law enforcement, and intelligence sharing.
- **8. Environment, Water, Natural Resources (EPWNR)**: GJLO enforces environmental policies; EPWNR aids in resource management and climate financing.



Emerging Issues

- Cyber Crime/Security: Growing digitization increases risks of cyber-attacks, requiring updated legal frameworks for modern global cybersecurity techniques.
- 2. Radicalization & Extremism: Rising youth radicalization through social media threatens national stability. Terrorist recruitment targets schools and religious institutions.
- 3. Complex Crimes: Emerging crimes such as dark web activities and crypto-related offenses challenge evidence collection and prosecution.
- **4. Business Environment Changes**: Technological advancements introduce new business models, presenting legal and security concerns for Kenya's competitiveness



Emerging Issues (Continued)

- 5. Psychoactive Substances: The rising abuse of unregulated drugs leads to increased mental health issues and unproductivity, calling for multisectoral regulations.
- 6. Unlicensed Accommodation Facilities: Growth of unregulated accommodations contributes to illegal alcohol sales, drugs, and security threats.
- 7. Political Polarization & Banditry: Political division and banditry disrupt national security, increasing inter-ethnic tensions and affecting service delivery in affected regions



Challenges

1. Inadequate Budget Allocations:

Budget cuts hinder GJLO's mandate, leading to unfunded initiatives and straining resources.

2. Conflicting Legal Frameworks:

Overlapping institutional roles create inefficiencies, reducing effective resource utilization.

3. Limited ICT Adoption:

Slow automation of services impairs sector modernization and operational efficiency.

4. Cross-Border Conflicts:

Instability along borders, particularly from Al-Shabaab, disrupts trade and security while fostering illegal activities.

5. Alcohol, Drug, & Substance Abuse:

Rising crime and lawlessness are linked to substance abuse, impacting youth and educational institutions.

6. Corruption:

Corruption undermines policy implementation, governance, and public trust, necessitating stronger anti-corruption efforts



Conclusion

- The Sector remains significant for improved governance in National Development Agenda, as enshrined in the Constitution and Vision 2030.Vision 2030 identified a set of governance principles to guide efforts in the Sector and ensure continued gains. Key strategic areas which include ;rule of law, electoral and political processes; democracy and public participation; transparency and accountability; public administration and service delivery; and security, peace—building and conflict management guide the development of the Sector programmes.
- Going forward ,the sector is committed to scaling up the implementation of the provision of the Constitution ,strengthen the rule of law ,increase access to justice ,ensure respect for Human rights ,equality and inclusion ;peace ,justice and strong institutions. This will enhance the effective implementation of BETA priorities. Most importantly, the sector shall endeavor to upscale the fight against corruption and make all public servants accountable.
- Significant resource gaps cited above highlight the need for increased budget allocations to meet sector goals and reduce pending bills.



Recommendations

To achieve the goals of the Constitution, Vision 2030, SDGs, MTP IV, and BETA Agenda, the Sector prioritizes investments in programs and projects to boost productivity and prosperity. Key recommendations include:

- 1. Cross-border Security Collaboration: Strengthen multi-agency collaboration to enhance border security.
- 2. Cyber Crime/Security: Update legal frameworks and policies for modern international policing approaches and ICT.
- **3. Policy, Legislative and Institutional Reforms**: Fast-track key reforms, including Government Chemist Authority Bill, Disaster Risk Management, Border Policy, Arms Policy, Election Regulations, and correctional framework alignment.
- **4. Alcohol, Drug, and Substance Abuse:** Implement frameworks to mitigate harms through societal approaches.
- **5. ICT Infrastructure Development:** Upgrade ICT infrastructure for advancements like digital crime reporting.
- **6. Acquisition of Specialized Equipment:** Invest in specialized equipment to address emerging crimes like terrorism.
- 7. Complex and Emerging Crimes: Enhance technical skills in areas like virtual currency and financial intelligence.
- **8. Domestic Resource Mobilization:** Focus on local resource mobilization for donor-dependent programs.
- **9. Ease of Doing Business:** Enact laws and policies for a supportive business environment.
- **10. Corruption and Unethical Conduct:** Strengthen anti-corruption practices under the National Ethics and Anti-Corruption Policy (NEAP).
- **11. Digitization**: Harmonize and integrate services for transparency and efficiency.
- 12. Office Infrastructure: Ensure adequate infrastructure for smooth program and project execution
